A call for statewide Listening Sessions

ACCR Inc, the advocacy arm of ACCR, invites you to organize a Listening Session between now and the November elections in your community so that ACCR Board members can meet with you in your community to discuss Legislative options and strategies for the 2011 Legislative Session in Montgomery. The ACCR Inc. Board has been evaluating several legislative options and strategies in light of our past efforts, and needs your input, ideas and feedback in a Listening Session in your community NOW.

We ask you to find a convenient time and public place like a school, library, or church building on a Sunday afternoon this fall for the citizens of your county to meet so that we can listen and learn from you and share information and material about several constitution reform legislative options being considered for 2011. We are asking that you engage your churches, civic clubs, school committees, community clubs, social clubs, neighbors, friends, and all who you think need to get involved and fired up by sharing together in the ACCR Legislative strategy development for 2011. If you are hosting a Bring it Back Home Session being led by Bob Jones with the ACCR Foundation, the education arm of ACCR, we will be happy to try to coordinate a Listening Session either before or after your Bring it Back Home Event if that

works best for you and your community. Or, we will be happy to come into your area at a time that you choose on a Sunday afternoon between 2 and 5 p.m. between now and the November elections.

Some of the constitution reform legislative options and strategies we would like to discuss and solicit your thoughts about include:

- A Citizens' Constitution Commission created by the Legislature or the Governor, to write a new constitution or amendments. In the past, Commissions have been created by Executive Order if the Governor creates a Commission, or a Legislative Resolution/Act if the Legislature creates a Commission. The Commission's draft Constitution and/or amendments would be purely advisory and still must be enacted Article by Article by the Legislature as Constitutional amendments or through citizens in a Constitutional Convention, and then subject to an ultimate vote of the people.
- The ACCR supported legislative Resolution to let the people vote on calling a Constitution Convention from the past two years, with revised dates for the 2011 Legislative Session. The Resolution requires a majority vote of the Legislature for approval

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Theatre of the Absurd

'Senator' lampoons 1901 mischief

ACCR Foundation establishes Theatre of the Absurd as one more dimension to the Bring It Back Home Education Program.

The idea was initiated by John Leo Wright, Jr., who debuted the fictional role of Senator 1901 at the Special Event following the Bailey Thomson Awards Luncheon August 19. He has volunteered to travel to Bring It Back Home Events to get the public's attention about the 1901 Constitution through this satirical comedy.

John was first invited to serve as a volunteer on the ACCR Foundation Marketing Team for his talents in media. His advertising experience began with the *Birmingham News*. He later became the Assistant Editor for *Catholic Week*. After working a year with Martin, White and Mickwee Advertising Agency, John moved his family to Selma to work for the Edmundite Southern Missions, a Catholic organization serving African-American families in a 10-county area. The Mission operated a parish church and school, outreach

programs, and a fund-raising office. It also founded Good Samaritan Hospital in Selma to provide health care for African-Americans who, due to segregation laws, were denied treatment at the other hospitals in the city. As Assistant Administrator of the hospital, he wrote articles for the Mission's fund-raising quarterly magazine.

While in Selma, he had the privilege of meeting and interviewing Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., for the Catholic News Service of America only days after the "Bloody Sunday" attack of the

marchers on the Edmund Pettus Bridge in March of 1965. Most of the injured marchers were treated at Good Samaritan Hospital. John was a witness to that frightening scene. Dozens of men and women sat on the floor near the emergency room moaning and gasping for breath from having been beaten and tear gassed.

In 1967, he returned to Birmingham to join the administrative staff of UAB Hospital as Director of Public Relations and news media spokesperson. In 1989, immediately after retiring from UAB, John worked at Miles College for two years as community and public relations advisor. While at UAB, he became involved in performing in stage plays with the University's Town and Gown Theater. Over 32 years, he has performed in more than 50 plays with several local community theater groups. John has also performed in three films, two locally produced. The most recent is "The Last Exorcism," released nationwide on August 27.

John's interest in working for a new Alabama constitution remained quietly in the background of his longtime advocacy work



for a modern transit system in Jefferson County. But recently, he has attended meetings to learn more about why a new state constitution is imperative in Alabama.

“Conversations with Audrey Salgado, ACCR Foundation President, and Mike Maetz, Greater Birmingham Ministries Constitution Reform Task Force Chair and ACCR Foundation Constitution Convention Coalition Liaison, brought me to a point of serious commitment to help our fellow Alabamians understand why we need a new state constitution,” John said.

“Then at a recent meeting, I was seated next to a college volunteer intern, Beth Amthor, reading Bailey Thomson’s *A Century of Controversy*. I immediately ordered a copy through the Homewood Library. When I read

Thomson’s introduction and the chapter by JSU Professor Harvey Jackson, III, entitled, “White Supremacy Triumphant,” THAT was the very moment I committed my heart, mind, and soul to do what I could to help my fellow

Alabamians understand the present Alabama Constitution was illegally, immorally, and fraudulently ratified when white proponents of the Constitution were able to change thousands of African-Americans’ ‘against’ votes to ‘for’ votes for ratification.

“Months earlier I attended the premiere of Melanie Jeffcoat’s *Open Secret* documentary. After reading Professor Jackson’s essay, I more clearly understood the evil vote manipulations of the writers of the 1901 Alabama Constitution – to deny African-American citizens of Alabama the right to vote.

“We must collectively and thoughtfully right this wrong of those misguided men. The Civil War and its aftermath continue to haunt us in Alabama. We must rise up, united, with courage and determination to shine the light of shared democratic governance in every city and town and hamlet in Alabama. A new state Constitution will be that light’s permanent source of power and good.”

to allow the people to vote on holding a constitutional convention, and then provides for delegate elections and a convention procedure for writing and ultimately ratifying by a vote of the people anything produced by a Convention.

- ACCR support of a Legislative Article by Article approach with support of specific amendments in the 2011 Legislative Session to address such important areas as Home Rule.
- Other strategic options being discussed by some include a grassroots or individual initiative to just vote "no" on constitutional amendments until people are given the right to vote on a Constitution Convention or other creative ways to create a grassroots focus.

We want to hear from you today and to get your thoughts and feedback on making the 2011 Legislative Session the most productive that ACCR and its sponsors and co-sponsors have ever had! Please consider

what you can do to organize your county this fall for a Listening Session to discuss the 2011 Legislative Session.

Now is also the TIME to be talking to and listening to all legislative candidates and making your voices heard before November. Be sure that you vote for candidates supporting the right of the people to vote on the question of a Constitution Convention and get your legislator committed to being a co-sponsor of a Resolution to let the people vote on a constitution convention.

Thomson Awards celebrate special contributions

On August 19 in Tuscaloosa's Bryant Conference Center, almost 400 supporters gathered to celebrate the 10th anniversary of ACCR and the Fourth Annual Bailey Thomson Awards Luncheon.

Attendees traveled from all over the state to hear an inspirational message from keynote speaker Dr. David Mathews, former University of Alabama President and current CEO of the Kettering Foundation, and to honor the five honorees of this year's awards. Dr. Mathews traced the progress made in the constitutional reform movement over the last 15-20 years as well as by ACCR since its inception 10 years ago.

Named Citizen Educator of the Year, **Melanie Jeffcoat** wrote, directed, and starred in the award-winning film, *Open Secret*.

The Community Foundation of Greater Birmingham's (CFGB) President, **Kate Nielsen**, accepted the Partner of the Year award. As a majority grant funder, the CFGB was a grantor for the mock constitutional convention and this year's Bring It Back Home educational project.

Presented with a one-time special Spirit Award, **Mark Berte** and **Hill Carmichael** both exhibited an ongoing passion moving the constitutional reform movement forward.

The top award, the Bailey Thomson Award, was presented to **Ed Gentle, III**, whose work in the reform movement has included working on the document, "The Alabama Constitution of 2000," and filing the 2009 lawsuit challenging the validity of the passage of the 1901 Constitution. Three of the plaintiffs in that lawsuit **Tommy Lee**, **Colonel Stone Johnson** - a former bodyguard for Reverend Fred Shuttlesworth during the Civil Rights Movement - and **Jack Zylman**, attended the luncheon with Mr. Gentle and were recognized during his remarks on the subject.

With the hard work of the Luncheon Steering Committee, this year's luncheon garnered a record number of corporate sponsors. Special thanks to the 2010 Bailey Thomson Awards Luncheon Steering Committee: **Johnnie Aycock**, **Jonathan Boatright**, **Wayne Childress**, **Elizabeth Dotts-Fleming**, **Ashley Harris**, **Marian Loftin**, **Riley Lumpkin**, **Cathy Randall**, and **Audrey Salgado**.
